

SW 606: Ethics and Human Subjects Research Social Work

This course has been designed to study the ethical underpinnings for the proper conduct of research involving human participants. Course topics will include a brief historical review of ethics in science; a short history of how we arrived at our current system of ethical oversight in human subjects' research; an examination of the codes, laws, and regulations that address human subjects' research. Throughout the course, we will seek to understand ethical dimensions in scientific inquiry. We will discuss the application and integration of ethical principles in human subjects' research – including ethics related to experimental design, participant recruitment and the consent process, management and access of scientific data, authorship and publication, the scientists' interaction with industry, dealing with conflicts of interest, and emerging societal issues that result from new technology and scientific advances.
